The new train station in Luang Prabang, Laos was built as part of a US\$ 6 billion loan under China's Belt and Road Initiative. According to the World Bank, poor countries like Laos faced a 35% increase in their debt interest payments in 2022.

Summary

In 2022 we resumed our field assignment work in Laos and Malaysia, Southeast Asia. We added substantial new content to both our Web portal and our YouTube channel. We revised our social media strategy and presence. We continued publishing our monthly opinion editorial articles.

We awarded an institutional educational grant to support indigenous education in Laos.

Web Portal Strategy

In 2022 we continued to follow our "tic-tactoe" strategy. "Tic" is keeping our Web portal up to date with the latest information technology trends. "Tac" is publishing new content. "Toe" is design — the user interface and user experience of our Web portal.

Tic. We made additional upgrades and optimizations on our platform for faster page loading. We also began dropping support for older web browsers. As "Web 3.0" and "Web3" continue to evolve, it is more important than ever to keep one's browser software up to date. As this trend continues, it becomes too burdensome to continue supporting older browsers.

We also consolidated the content under our "Publish your Work" program. This will make it easier to add new content to that section of our Web portal in the future.

Tac. 2022 was a "tac" year. We continued to publish our monthly opinion editorials giving an indigenous peoples' perspective on current events. Our opinion editorials represent independent journalism and are entirely uninfluenced by corporate interests or media advertising.

In 2022 we closed our Facebook account due to unresolvable technical issues on that platform.

We created a Twitter account as our new social media platform. While that account remains active, we stopped tweeting toward

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the end of the year due to recent developments at Twitter. Our tweeting is now on hold while we continue to monitor the direction and the policies of the platform.

Resources

The resources on our Web portal continued to be used extensively by non-governmental, non-profit and media organizations, interns, government agencies, publishing companies, journalists, students and educators around the world.

Programs

In 2022 we awarded a \$500 grant under our *Institutional Educational Grants* program to *Empathy International* in Laos. This grant will support that organization's educational programs which benefit indigenous people in northern Laos.
